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# Why I chose this program

#### [Why I decided to study abroad]

# Experience

### [Where I stayed]

I stayed in the medical dormitory for 4 weeks. This was located about a 12-minute walk to the hospital where we practiced, Srinagarind Hospital. I had a option of staying at hotel but I decided to stay here because it was the closest to the hospital and free cost. I stayed in one room with my close classmate and we spent 4 weeks together like family.

## [How was my practice]

With that uncertainty in mind, I chose to practice in the general surgery. I think my decision was right. There are three reasons for this. First, I was able to assist in surgery more than in Japan. For example, sewing flesh together, holding laparoscope, using forceps and so on...Second, the diseases introduced to general surgery in Thailand are not so much different from in Japan, so it was easy to compare Thailand with Japan. Last, it wasn't so difficult to understand what surgeons are doing even if you're poor at English. Actually I'm not good at speaking and listening to English, but gentle surgeons gestured and explained me politely in the operation room. This may be one of the reasons why I prefer practicing in surgery to internal medicine.

I'll tell you honestly about the bad and good things about studying abroad inThailand in April. The bad thing is that April in Thailand is New Year, so many KKU students went back to their hometowns and I couldn't communicate enough.
